

EXPERIENCE EUROPE AND EXPLORE ITS HISTORY AND CULTURE

Earn six hours of academic credit while living in the charming university town of Leuven (Louvain) in Belgium. Centrally located, Leuven is only 25 minutes by train from Brussels (the capital of Belgium and one of Europe's principal cities), one hour and 20 minutes from Paris, and two hours from London.

Loyola's Summer Study Program in Belgium is open to all students in good standing at Loyola or at other universities. Students take two courses from those listed below. All courses focus directly or indirectly on Europe and the region we visit. Your studies will be enhanced by guided bus trips to cultural and historical sites including a medieval castle in Ghent; the picturesque canal city of Bruges; Charlemagne's cathedral and treasury in Aachen and the cathedral and the old town in Cologne, Germany; the Rembrandt and Vermeer exhibits in the Rijksmuseum, and the Van Gogh Museum and Anne Frank house in Amsterdam in the Netherlands; World War I memorials and fortifications in Verdun, and to Ft. Breendonk, a nearby Nazi prisoner camp. There are guided walking tours of Leuven and Brussels. Independent international and regional travel are also encouraged. There will be one two-day weekend and one three-day weekend to facilitate such travel. Those wishing to stay at Loyola House on the weekends may do so and take day excursions from Leuven.

Students stay at Loyola House, a residence operated by Loyola University Maryland. Only a 10-minute walk from the center of old Leuven, the location offers ready access to museums, restaurants, stores, and gardens. Facilities are shared with students of many nationalities, and our students find it an excellent situation for meeting and exchanging views with Europeans. The rooms accommodate two or three students. Students wishing to room with specific individuals should indicate their choice. There are fully equipped kitchens, pay washing machines, a computer room, and a TV room in the housing complex.

The program is co-directed by Dr. David Moore and the Rev. Robert Gerlich, S.J., of the Loyola Department of History. Fr. Gerlich is the on-site coordinator.

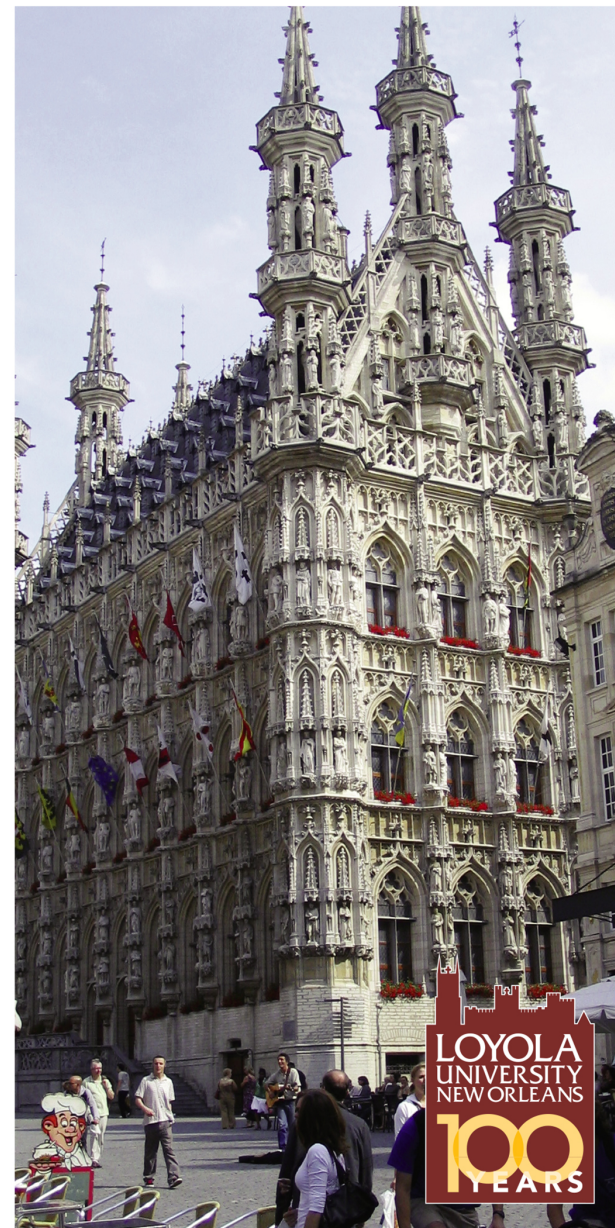

COURSES ORDINARILY OFFERED

HIST Q260, World War I Through History and Literature

A study of World War I utilizing literature and images to explore the nature and impact of the war. The course will include visits to the Flanders Fields Museum in Ypres, trenches on the Ypres battlefield, and the battlefield at Verdun.

HIST G364, History of Belgium

An exploration of Belgian history, society, and institutions enhanced by visits to important historical and cultural sites in Belgium.

HIST Q270, The American Character

An examination of European influence on the American character and vice versa.

RELS O252, Catholicism

A study of Catholicism with special emphasis on the Belgian and other European sites we visit.

PROGRAM COSTS

The program costs \$3,975. A non-refundable deposit of \$500 is due with the application. The remaining amount of \$3,475 is due by **March 1 or when the student applies if after that date**. Students can continue to apply as long as space is available and the payment schedule will be adjusted accordingly. After April 1, refunds (less the deposit) are made only if the student is able to find a replacement. After May 1, there is no refund.

The \$3,975 covers room, two Loyola courses, five daylong bus trips, medical insurance, entrance fees, and a weekly allowance (a total of 200 Euros) to help defray food costs. Students will need money for food, entertainment, and optional travel. A "Loyola flight" will be identified for the New Orleans/Brussels round trip flight and a bus from Leuven will pick up and drop off students arriving and departing on that flight. All study abroad students must also pay the university study abroad fee of \$300, billed separately through Student Finance.



ACADEMIC POLICIES

Loyola's general academic policies apply to study abroad programs. Because of the timeframe, students must attend all classes and trips in order to fulfill the requirements for the courses.

Students must check with their academic department or university to determine that the credits and/or grades will be accepted toward graduation requirements at their institution.

Any student currently enrolled and in good standing at an accredited institution may register for the Belgium Program.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

In order to attend the program, students must have a valid up-to-date passport and any necessary visas. U.S. citizens do not need visas for Belgium, but citizens of other countries may need one. It is up to all students not holding U.S. passports to check with the Belgian Embassy in Washington, D.C., about the necessary visas.
